cars and murders sullied the city's name even as the incidence of road rage increased in pro-portion with the rush-hour traf-fic moving bumper to bumper, despite the Metro.

Finally, the trifurcation of the Municipal Corporation of Delhi meant that there will be separate elections next year for South Delhi, North Delhi and for Trans-Defin, North Defin and for Irans-Yamuna areas, with each getting a Mayor and functioning inde-pendently of each other. 50 per cent reservation for women will ensure greater participation by Defin's women.
